






About the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada

- Responsible for implementing the Impact Assessment Act and the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012, including:
 - Applying the precautionary principle to ensure that a project is not likely to cause significant adverse environmental effects.
 - Promoting communication and cooperation between the federal government and Indigenous peoples.
 - Providing opportunities for timely and meaningful public participation.
 - Promoting sustainable development to maintain a healthy environment and economy.

Federal Environmental Assessment Process

IMPORTANT: Conditions identified in the Minister's EA decision statement are legally enforceable.

Federal Environmental Assessment Process

 The Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) Guidelines identify the environmental components that need to be studied by NWP Coal Canada Ltd.

Physical Environment

- Surface water
- Groundwater
- Geology and geochemistry
- Atmospheric environment
- Terrain and soils
- Transboundary environment

Biological Environment

- Fish and fish habitat
- Migratory birds and their habitat
- Species at risk

Human Environment

- Indigenous health and socioeconomic conditions
- Physical and cultural heritage
- Current use of land and resources for traditional purposes
- Historical, archaeological, paleontological, or architectural sites/structures
- Impacts on Aboriginal or Treaty Rights

EIS/Application Information Requirements

- The proponent must include the following information in the EIS/Application:
 - purpose of the project;
 - alternative means of carrying out the project;
 - environmental effects, including those caused by accidents and malfunctions, and cumulative effects from other projects;
 - mitigation measures and follow-up program;
 - significance of the environmental effects;
 - public comments; and
 - changes to the project caused by the environment.
- The Agency has completed a conformity review and has advised the Proponent that it is of the opinion that the EIS/Application contains sufficient information to proceed to a detailed technical review.

IMPORTANT: All input received during the public comment period will be incorporated into the federal technical review.

Consultation with Indigenous Groups

- The Agency and EAO will meaningfully consult, engage and collaborate with Indigenous groups on:
 - identifying potential adverse impacts and effects of the Project on Indigenous peoples, their communities and their rights;
 - determining measures to avoid, mitigate or minimize those potential impacts and effects;
 - key documents, the engagement process and, if necessary, information request(s);
 - identifying opportunities for collaboration;
 - incorporating Indigenous knowledge and any other cultural considerations and customs into the assessment process and project decision making; and
 - consensus seeking throughout the EA process.

Consultation continued

- The Agency will engage and collaborate with Indigenous groups in a manner that is consistent with:
 - upholding the honour of the Crown and meeting our duty to consult;
 - the Principles respecting the Government of Canada's relationship with Indigenous peoples;
 - the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples
 - Agency guidance -- Considering Aboriginal traditional knowledge in environmental assessments conducted under the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012; and
 - Agency guidance -- Assessment of Potential Impacts on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples

Federal Authorities with potential decisions

Environment and Climate Change Canada

- Migratory Birds Convention Act
 - Permit for vegetation clearing during migratory bird nesting season
- Species at Risk Act
 - Permit
- International River Improvements Act
 - Notification

Fisheries and Oceans Canada

- Section 35(2) of the Fisheries Act
 - Authorization for harmful alteration, disruption, or destruction of fish habitat
- Species at Risk Act
 - Permits required for activities that may affect a listed species or its habitat and for the handling of sensitive species for wildlife salvages.

Natural Resources Canada

- paragraph 7(1)(a) of the Explosives Act
 - License required for the onsite explosive manufacture
 - License for the storage of explosive products

EIS Summary Review

- We want to know what you think about the information presented in the EIS summary, including:
 - The description of potential environmental effects from the project;
 - The mitigation measures that have been identified to avoid, reduce or accommodate these effects;
 - The predicted significance of adverse environmental effects, after mitigation is applied; and
 - The follow-up program proposed to confirm the EA predictions and the effectiveness of the mitigation measures.

Impact Assessment Agency of Canada Next Steps



- Public comment period on the EIS Summary. Comments due by February 28, 2024.
- Complete the technical review of the EIS.
- Work with NWP Coal Canada Ltd. to resolve issues and identify appropriate mitigation measures.




Draft the EA
Report and
Potential
Conditions

- Review comments and produce a "draft EA Report", summarizing:
 - the EA process and findings, including how public comments have been addressed, and
 - conclusions on the potential for the Project to cause significant adverse environmental effects.
- Draft potential enforceable conditions based on mitigation and follow-up monitoring.
- Public comment period on the draft EA Report and potential conditions.

EA Decision

- Review comments, finalize the EA report, and submit Final EA Report to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change for consideration.
- Minister issues decision statement, including the determination of significance and enforceable conditions.
