**Subject: Notice of Commencement of the Impact Assessment for the
Webequie Supply Road Project**

Thank you for your continued participation in the planning phase of the federal impact assessment for the Webequie Supply Road Project (the Project). On February 24, 2020, the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (the Agency) posted a Notice of Commencement on the Canadian Impact Assessment Registry Internet site (the Registry) regarding an impact assessment pursuant to the *Impact Assessment Act* (IAA) for the Project. The Project is now in the impact statement phase of the federal impact assessment.

The objective of this letter is to:

- Provide you with the finalized Tailored Impact Statement Guidelines (the Guidelines) that have been issued to the proponent (Enclosure 1);
- Provide you with the finalized Indigenous Engagement and Partnership Plan (IEPP), (Enclosure 2);
- Demonstrate how comments were incorporated into the finalized Guidelines and IEPP (Enclosure 3);
- Share the Agency's preliminary understanding of the potential adverse impacts of the Project on Constance Lake First Nation's exercise of rights (Enclosure 4);
- Identify the next steps in the impact assessment process and opportunities for Constance Lake First Nation to continue to participate in the impact assessment for the Project (Enclosure 5);

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Finalized Guidelines and Indigenous Engagement and Partnership Plan

Comments provided to the Agency during the comment period, from December 19, 2019 to January 28, 2020, on the Guidelines and the IEPP, helped to define the scope and factors to be studied during the federal impact assessment. The input received has been reflected in the Guidelines and the IEPP.

For further information on how the Agency considered your comments and incorporated them into the Guidelines and IEPP, please see the attached Summary Table of Comments.

Pursuant to the *Information and Management of Time Limits Regulations*, the Agency has posted the Guidelines and IEPP on the Registry and has delivered these documents to the proponent, Webequie First Nation. Pursuant to section 19(1) of the *IAA*, the Agency must be satisfied that the proponent, Webequie First Nation, has provided the required information and studies outlined in the Tailored Impact Statement Guidelines within three years from the date of Notice of Commencement.

The Agency has also published the Notice of Commencement, the Guidelines, the IEPP, the Public Participation Plan, the Permitting Plan and the Cooperation Plan with the Province of Ontario, on the Registry. Information Available to the Crown with Respect to the Potential Adverse Impacts of the Webequie Supply Road Project on Constance Lake First Nation's Exercise of Rights

The information available to the Crown on the Project's potential to cause adverse impacts on Constance Lake First Nation's exercise of rights is summarized in Enclosure 4. Please review this information and provide the Agency with any additional information that you feel would contribute to the Agency's analysis by **March 24, 2020**.

In addition, please see the Guide on How to Participate during the Federal Impact Assessment Process (Enclosure 5). This document outlines the information, including Indigenous knowledge, that you may consider sharing with the proponent and the Agency to inform the development of the proponent's Impact Statement. Enclosure 5 also identifies areas of interest where Indigenous knowledge would be helpful in assessing potential effects of the Project and potential impacts on the exercise of rights of Indigenous peoples.

Community-Specific Annex to the IEPP

The IEPP provides information on how the Agency will be working with your community during the remaining phases of the impact assessment process for the Project. During the previous comment period Constance Lake First Nation expressed interest in working with the Agency to develop a community-specific consultation workplan to incorporate into the IEPP additional community-specific activities. Please note that the Agency is currently compiling your previous feedback into a proposed draft consultation work plan. The Agency will be reaching out to your community in the coming months to co-develop the consultation work plan.
