Regional Assessments Under the Impact Assessment Act


REGIONAL ASSESSMENTS UNDER IAA

- Impact Assessment Act (IAA) allows the Minister to establish a committee or authorize the Agency to conduct a Regional Assessment (RA) of the effects of existing or future physical activities in a region (Sections 92-93)
- Sections 94 and 96-103 of the IAA set out various procedural requirements for the conduct of RAs under the Act
- RA is a key aspect of the implementation framework for the IAA, with the objective of improving IA effectiveness and efficiency
- IAA requires that the results of RAs be considered at several points in subsequent project-specific impact assessments



REGIONAL ASSESSMENTS UNDER IAA

- RAs have been defined by IAAC as:
 - Studies conducted in areas of existing projects or anticipated development to inform planning and management of cumulative effects and project impact assessments
 - RAs allow the Government of Canada to go beyond project-focused impact assessments to understand the regional context and provide more comprehensive analyses to help inform future impact assessment decisions
- RA objectives can vary, and range from providing information, analysis and mitigation to future projects and IAs, to a regional framework for assessing and addressing cumulative effects
- IAAC RA program includes planning and conduct of several RAs, review of potential RAs, and development of associated policy




WHO CONDUCTS AN RA?

- The Minister or Environment and Climate Change is responsible for establishing a committee or authorizing the Agency to conduct a regional assessment
- If the region is partly or entirely outside of federal lands, the Minister can enter into an agreement with another jurisdiction for the joint conduct of the regional assessment
- The Minister must establish or approve the terms of reference for the regional assessment and appoint or approve the appointment of a committee, if applicable



GENERAL STEPS IN AN RA

Planning

• Establish the assessment goal; determine the outputs, key issues, boundaries and other aspects of the regional assessment

Begin RA

 Minister approves terms of reference and established a committee, if applicable

Conduct assessmen Committee or Agency conducts the regional assessment

Report

 Regional assessment report prepared by the committee or Agency and submitted to Minister

Follow-up

 May be developed to verify, track or implement the report recommendations and keep the assessment information up to date




THE RA REQUEST

Requestor: Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke

Rationale:


- Increased shipping activity and related industrialization in region has resulted in adverse effects and cumulative effects, thereby interfering with their ability to exercise their section 35 rights.
- Individual project IAs are not effective in addressing these issues and potential effects in the region.
- RA is required to understand the current state of the river, as well as the cumulative effects of current and future projects in a regional context, particularly in light of proposed and potential future development.



Regional Assessment Area in Request from the Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke


CONSIDERATIONS

- 1. Is large-scale development, including potential designated projects under the Act, expected in the next 5–10 years in the region?
- 2. Are there environmentally or otherwise sensitive areas or components located in the region that might be affected by development?
- Does current and future development in the region have the potential to cause adverse effects, including cumulative effects, that fall within federal jurisdiction?
- 4. Does development in the region have the potential to cause adverse impacts on the rights of Indigenous people?



CONSIDERATIONS

- 5. How would the regional assessment inform future federal impact assessments?
- 6. Whether an existing or planned initiative would adequately address the issues raised.
- 7. Information from proponents, provinces, territories or Indigenous peoples that the Agency might have from other areas of its work, including from project impact assessments either underway or completed.
- 8. Available resources to conduct regional assessments



MINISTER'S RESPONSE

The Minister determined:


- There are potential merits (e.g., potential for cumulative effects, opportunities for collaboration) to a regional assessment
- It is beneficial to undertake further analysis and engagement with the Province of Quebec, Indigenous peoples and stakeholders before a decision is made

 Agency to initiate an engagement process over the coming months and to provide Minister the results of these discussions by spring 2021.

Latest update




October 29, 2020 — The Minister of Environment and Climate Change received a <u>request</u> for a regional assessment related to the <u>St.</u> Lawrence River area in July 2020. On October 27, 2020, the Minister determined that further analysis and engagement is required before making a decision on whether to conduct a regional assessment under the Impact Assessment Act. The reasons for the Minister's determination are provided in the <u>Minister's response</u>.
