**Subject: Designation Request for the Baldwin East Aerodrome Project
under the *Impact Assessment Act* – Please Reply by March 3, 2023**

On February 3, 2023, the Minister of Environment and Climate Change (the Minister) received a request to designate the Baldwin East Aerodrome Project (the Project), under subsection 9(1) of the *Impact Assessment Act* (IAA). The designation request from the Pefferlaw Area Ratepayers is enclosed (Enclosure 1).

The Proposed Project

Sutton Airport Development Inc. is proposing to construct and operate a new aerodrome in the Town of Georgina, Ontario. As proposed, the Project would include two paved, all-weather, marked and lighted runways which would have a maximum length of 893 metres and 991 metres, respectively. The Project would also include a clubhouse building, an aircraft hangar and supporting use development lots, and aerodrome access roads.

Designation Request Process

The Project as proposed is not a designated project, as described in the *Physical Activities Regulations*. The impact assessment process under the IAA only applies to designated projects.

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Under subsection 9(1) of the IAA the Minister may, by order, designate a physical activity that is not prescribed in the *Physical Activities Regulations*.¹ The Minister may do this, if, in the Minister's opinion, the physical activity may cause adverse effects within federal jurisdiction or adverse direct or incidental effects (resulting from federal decisions), or public concerns related to those effects warrant the designation. This discretionary authority enables the Minister to consider **exceptional circumstances**, such as where a project is proposed in an environmentally sensitive location or there is a new or unique type of project that was not contemplated when the Project List was developed. The Minister would consider a number of relevant factors including whether or not:

- standard design features and mitigation would address the anticipated adverse effects;
- the potential adverse effects can be adequately managed through other existing legislative or regulatory mechanisms.

The Agency prepares a recommendation to the Minister on whether the Project should be designated and considers all the information and comments received. The Agency considers comments and input from the public, Indigenous communities, the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks, the Town of Georgina, the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority, and expert advice from federal authorities.

According to subsection 9(4) of IAA, it is expected that the Minister will respond, with reasons, to the request by May 14, 2023.

Invite for Input

The Agency welcomes views and input from representatives of the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority to inform the Agency's analysis for the designation request. Given the 90-day legislated time limit for the Minister to make a decision, the Agency will be able to consider comments submitted by **March 3, 2023**.

The Agency would like to understand if Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority has policies, legislative or regulatory process or approvals that may be relevant and could serve as a means to address concerns expressed about the Project. In particular, the following issues have been raised by the requestor:

- Potential impacts to fish and fish habitat (e.g., surface water contamination from runoff into Lake Simcoe via the Burnie Creek);
- Potential impacts to terrestrial species at risk and/or migratory birds and their habitat (e.g., from habitat loss; habitat contamination; noise);
- Potential impacts to wetlands and the Greenbelt Plan Area within the Natural Heritage System of the Protected Countryside designation per the *Greenbelt Plan, 2017*;
- Potential impacts to surface water and/or groundwater quality, including drinking water;
- Potential impacts from the use of contaminated soil fill, including on human health; and
- Potential impacts on air quality, including on human health.

If yes, please describe the relevant Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority policies, legislative or regulatory process or approvals, and indicate if they would involve public and Indigenous consultation, and if there are any issues resolution processes that would apply to the Project.
